

Parkland shooting commissioners: Embarrass school districts into complying with state security law

Ten Florida school districts fail to comply with the state requirement to have an **<u>armed guard</u> <u>on every campus</u>**, and now they may face public embarrassment from the state commission investigating the Parkland school shooting.

"I want their names public," said Polk County Sheriff Grady Judd, a, member of the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Commission. "I want them called out. I want to make sure there is a guardian or school resource officer on every campus across this state full time when school gets back in. 

ORDER DIRECTING IMPANELMENT OF A STATEWIDE GRAND JURY

THE COURT, having considered the Petition of the Honorable Ron DeSantis, Governor of Florida, for an order to impanel a statewide grand jury, and being fully advised of the relevant matters, hereby finds as follows:

A. The Petitioner, Honorable Ron DeSantis, Governor of Florida, has shown good and sufficient reason exists and that it is in the public interest to impanel a statewide grand jury, with jurisdiction throughout the State of Florida, to investigate crime, return indictments, make presentments, and otherwise perform all functions of a grand jury with regard to the following offenses, listed in section 905.34, Florida Statutes:

 bribery, burglary, carjacking, home-invasion robbery, criminal usury, extortion, gambling, kidnaping, larceny, murder, prostitution, perjury, and robbery;

(2) crimes involving narcotic or other dangerous drugs;

(3) any violations of the provisions of the Florida Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organization (RICO) Act, including any offense listed in the definition of racketeering activity in section 895.02(8)(a), Florida Statutes, providing such listed offense is investigated in connection with a violation of section 895.03, Florida Statutes, and is charged in a separate count of an information or indictment containing a count charging a violation of section 895.03, the prosecution of which listed offense may continue independently if the prosecution of the violation of section 895.03 is terminated for any reason;






The grand jury will investigate any crime or wrong within Florida Statute § 905.34 that relates to the following:

- Whether refusal or failure to follow the mandates of school-related safety laws, such as the Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School Public Safety Act, <u>results in unnecessary and</u> <u>avoidable risk to students across the state;</u>
- Whether public entities committed and continue to commit fraud and deceit by accepting state funds conditioned on implementation of certain safety measures while <u>knowingly failing</u> <u>to act;</u>
- Whether school officials committed and continue to commit fraud and deceit by mismanaging, failing to use, and diverting funds from multi-million-dollar bonds specifically solicited for school safety initiatives; and
- Whether school officials violated and continue to violate state law by systematically <u>underreporting incidents</u> of criminal activity to the Florida Department of Education.



Local governments actions such as requiring procedures or documentation to ensure compliance with background checks and waiting periods for gun purchases and requiring reporting of failed background checks

Penalties against local governments and officials if they violate the prohibition on passing gun regulations

Local officials can face fines up to \$5,000 and potential removal from office.
