### SBOE Receives Reports on School Safety Assessment, AMSTI Program

State Superintendent of Education Dr. Eric Mackey presented resolutions at Thursday's State Board of Education meeting commending the service of **Betty Peters** (District 2) and Mary Scott Hunter (District 8) at their final board meeting. Neither sought re-election at the end of their terms. Newly elected board members Tracie West (District 2) and Dr. Wayne Reynolds (District 8) will be sworn in next week to fill these posts.

In other action, the board recognized 2018 Milken Educator Award winner Heather Hurt. The fifth-grade teacher at Vestavia Hills Elementary School Central (Vestavia Hills City Schools) was presented with the award in October, receiving \$25,000 with the recognition.

The board also announced its intent to amend the Alabama Administrative Code pertaining to teacher preparation programs, specifically for grades 4-8. The SBOE holds the authority to approve college of education programs for Alabama's universities and colleges. That authority helps ensure high-quality teacher preparation programs that prepare new teachers for their careers as 21st-century educators.

In its work session, the board heard an assessment report about school emergency notification systems conducted by nSide, a Florence-based firm that helps schools use assistive technologies to address safety. An outgrowth of the governor's task force on school safety, the assessment is the first phase of a project examining the process school systems use to communicate critical information before, during and after emergencies. Mackey explained the assessment is part of an effort to implement a unified emergency alert system for schools across the state. The discussion included potential ways to improve communication such as opportunities to submit safety tips, sending alerts and the ability of outside safety officials to access existing surveillance cameras.

The math, physical education and health courses of study committees will present reports at next month's board work session, and the board is expected to take action on the courses of study during the March board meeting. Mackey announced the SBOE will appoint volunteers to the courses of study committees for English/language arts and career technical education at next month's board meeting.

The board received a <u>report</u> from research firm Empirical Education Inc. about the impact of the Alabama Math, Science and Technology Initiative (AMSTI). The research was conducted pursuant to a request by the state legislature for an outside organization to assess the program's efficacy. The report indicated a positive result for students whose teachers were AMSTI-trained. Those students had a two-percent greater gain on math assessment results and a four-percent greater gain on science assessments than those with non AMSTI-trained teachers. Students in poverty and special education made a one-percent greater gain in math and science when they had an AMSTItrained teacher; however, English Language Leaners performed worse.

Board members asked about the cost and practical workings of AMSTI, including how the toolkits, which require annual refurbishment, had been factored into the study. The report also sparked questions about the program's use across the state, how the research was conducted and how schools were selected for the study. Mackey said AMSTI staff will present additional information and answer questions at a future work session.

The next State Board of Education meeting will take place Feb.14 at 10 a.m., in Montgomery, followed by a work session to follow at 11 a.m.
