### **Board Work Session Features Robust Discussion on Proposed Math Standards**

The State Board of Education work session Thursday focused largely on the <u>revised</u> <u>course of study for mathematics</u>. If approved by the board in March, local school systems may voluntarily adopt the standards for the 2019-20 school year before they become mandatory in 2020-21.

A committee of Alabama teachers and other professionals, chaired by former Huntsville and now Gulf Shores Superintendent Matt Akin, conducted a review of the math standards, using multiple state and national resources to develop its initial draft. That draft underwent a one-month public review, and every public comment was then considered and addressed as needed before presenting the revised proposal to the state board Thursday.

Deputy State Superintendent of Education Dr. Daniel Boyd said the effort took seriously the challenge to raise Alabama's bottom NAEP ranking in mathematics scores. Boyd added that the effort called for moving beyond the status quo.

Several items were highlighted by board members during the discussion, including a change that now will require every senior in high school to take a mathematics course. Dr. Cynthia McCarty (District 6) commended that change and urged the ALSDE to provide materials for parents to help make the standards as clear and concise as possible.

New board member Tracie West (District 2) also praised the committee's work, saying it appeared that the committee began the work with the end in mind. One of the committee's primary goals was to identify higher education math courses and provide a clear pathway for k-12 students to select the courses needed to stay on track. Board members encouraged the same approach for students on the career and technical education pathway.

Boyd outlined the comprehensive effort to provide professional development in the field for teachers about the standards, including the use of in-service centers, working with AMSTI and collaboration with the A+ Education Partnership. Jackie Ziegler (District 1) strongly encouraged the ALSDE to emphasize communication in its efforts to inform educators about available professional development for the new math standards. Even the best resources won't help end users if they aren't aware of them, Ziegler explained. She urged continuous, sustained professional development on the standards. West suggested a parent portal or statewide toolkit resource as well.

Also during Thursday's work session, the board reviewed the proposal for new physical education and health courses of study, which were developed by a committee of teachers, practitioners and other professionals and chaired by Hoover Superintendent Dr. Kathy Murphy. Murphy's presentation began with a dire warning that children in this generation are in jeopardy of being the first in history to have a shorter projected life span than their parents. The proposed standards would now include adapted physical education standards for students with disabilities. Scheduled discussion about proposed changes to the Alabama Administrative Code regarding yoga rules was deferred. State Superintendent of Education Dr. Mackey indicated the ALSDE had been notified about legal concerns that need to be addressed.

At the regular meeting Thursday, the board appointed members to two courses of study committees: English Language Arts and Career and Technical Education. The committees will review the courses of study over the next year, and the process again will include public review before presenting a proposal to be considered by the State Board next year.

The board adopted resolutions to officially recognize February as Career and Technical Education month and March as Arts Education month. State Superintendent of Education Eric Mackey also informed the board about the selection of PowerSchool as a new student learning management system. The system will be onboarded beginning in fall 2020. Mackey assured the board he expects a seamless transition and the current system will be continued until the transition is completed.

Mackey ended the meeting with a brief update

Mackey indicated the ALSDE always reviews data and performs a deep dive when an anomaly is discovered. A full report will be provided to the board in March about the graduation rates for special needs students.

#### **Next State Board Meeting**

The next board meeting will be held in Montgomery on March 14 at 10 a.m., followed by a work session. The board will then begin its two-day retreat on March 14 and 15.

#### House Ways & Means Education Committee Meeting

The House Ways and Means Education Committee held a pre-session meeting this week in Montgomery. The meeting included presentations from Pre-K, Alabama community colleges, Alabama Retirement Systems and more. Chairman Bill Poole also asked State Superintendent Dr. Eric Mackey to deliver a <u>presentation about the</u> <u>AMSTI program</u>. Another meeting will be held to focus on the Alabama Reading Initiative.
