



#### How was your school system funded?<sup>1</sup>



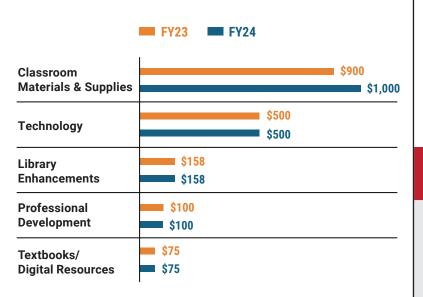
