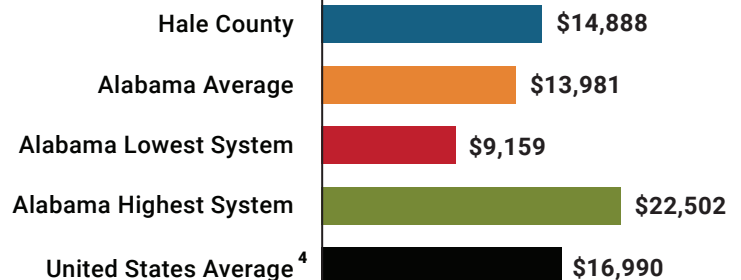

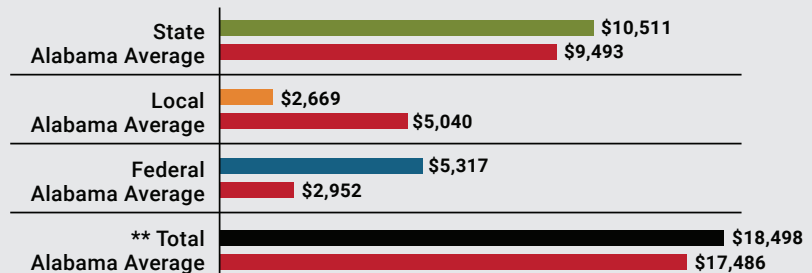

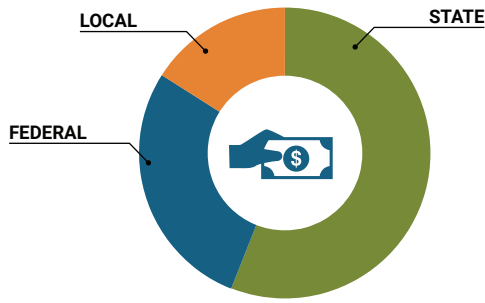
## OVERALL SYSTEM RANK 40

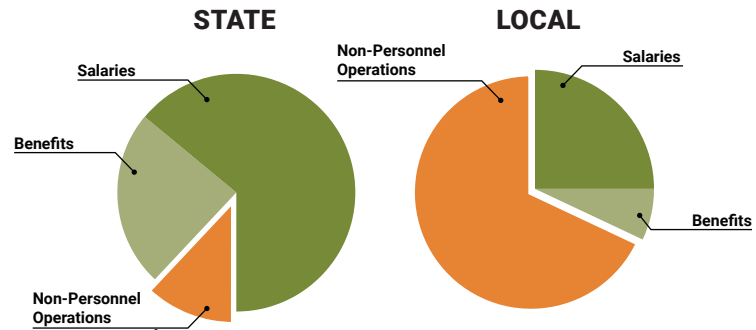
